## Section 2: What We Expect

## A. Expectations - 5 "P's" to Powerful Performances

Members of the Blue Valley West Bands demonstrate our values and work towards our mission by being:

## Punctual

$\delta \quad$ To be early is to be on time; to be on time is to be late; to be late is to be early for the next rehearsal! Plan accordingly!

## Prepared

§ Have your instrument, music, pencil, equipment, and supplies ready before every rehearsal and performance begins.
$\delta \quad$ The more you put in, the more you get out. Time spent practicing on your own enables all to achieve more.

## Present

§ Focus on the task at hand, not on distractions - be in the moment
$\delta \quad$ Listen to and follow instructions the first time they are given.
$\delta \quad$ When you talk you take away the ability of others to listen and learn - Music is an art created on a canvas of silence.

## Purposeful

$\delta \quad$ Always work in a forward direction - never waste a rep - practice and perform with intent!
$\delta \quad$ Find something to improve each and every time we rehearse - "Do something better!"

## Proud

§ Do your part to keep the band room neat and clean - pick up trash, put things away, and keep all food outside.
$\delta \quad$ Keep your instrument in good working order. Leave all other instruments and equipment alone.
$\delta \quad$ Carry yourself in a professional manner and you will be treated as such.
§ Saying "please and thank you" and showing good manners go a long way!

## B. Consequences and Rewards

Should a band member have difficulty meeting the above expectations, the following actions may be taken:
$\delta$ Redirection of verbal reminder.
$\delta$ Private conference between the student and director.
$\delta$ Conference with student, director, and parents to discuss behaviors and expectations.
$\delta \quad$ Suspension from a performance or special activity.
$\delta \quad$ Referral to their Principal for appropriate consequences.
$\delta \quad$ Other steps as outlined by policies of Blue Valley West High School and Blue Valley USD \#229.

Following our expectations in all rehearsals, performances, and events enables us ALL to reach our highest potential!

## C. Food For Thought

Excellence in any field is the result of hard work and dedication. Failure requires an equal amount of lack of effort and apathy. The unique atmosphere of a music program is that students have the opportunity to push themselves to whatever level they choose. At the same time, the overall musical level of the band is dependent upon the efforts of every single member. As human beings, there is always something we can learn or do better than we already are. Every time we rehearse or perform, strive to play or do something better than you did the previous rehearsal or performance! Hence the phrase: "Do Something Better!"

## A. Grading Categories

In each band course, students will participate in a variety of assignments and assessments to help guide their musical learning and development. Grades are earned using the following rubric and weighting system in all band classes.
§ Musical Performance: Students participate in a variety of performance opportunities throughout the year, and attendance at assigned performances is required of all band students. Please see the Attendance Policy for more details.
$\delta \quad$ Musical Engagement: Participation in music learning activities, namely in-class and evening rehearsals. This can also include special rehearsals and other non-performing activities that support and enhance the band curriculum.
$\delta$ Musical Development: Students demonstrate progress in developing their musicianship via assessments of technical and musical skills and concepts.
$\delta \quad$ Musical Enrichment: Students further their musical knowledge and skill through activities such as listening logs, performance evaluations, video critiques, theory lessons, composition projects, etc.

## B. Grading Rubric

Grades are earned based upon the following rubric.

## A. Attendance Policy

Band is a co-curricular academic class, meaning that all class activities are graded whether they occur during or outside of the school day. Band is unique in that there is no "bench." ALL students play a crucial role in the musical success of each performance, therefore attendance at ALL rehearsals and performances is required and factors into each student's grade.

Planning and communication are the keys for preventing and solving conflicts. Make a habit of comparing the band schedule with all other school and family events. Advanced communication by email is expected for any schedule conflicts. In the event of illness, an email or phone call to the director(s) before the performance is expected.

## Performance absences will be categorized as CLEARED or UNCLEARED.

$\delta$ CLEARED PERFORMANCE absences are those that were communicated in advance via email, and a subsequent in-person conversation with a director to seek possible compromises and / or obtain a make-up assignment. Advanced communication should occur as soon as conflict is noted, usually weeks ahead of the performance conflict.
$\delta$ UNCLEARED PERFORMANCE absences are those that are not communicated in advance or absences with no prior notice. Failure to complete a performance make-up assignment will also result in an uncleared absence.
$\delta$ REHEARSAL absences should be communicated in advance and students will need to complete any assigned make-up work or additional practice to clear the absence.

## B. School Activities / Athletics / Programs

Students are strongly encouraged to take advantage of the many academic and athletic opportunities offered at Blue Valley West! Many band members participate in multiple activities and sports. Students involved in activities and athletics must be diligent about balancing rehearsals, practices, games, performances, and homework, but with some careful planning it is very manageable.

In the rare event that a conflict arises between school activities, sponsors will try to work out a solution that allows a student to participate in both events. Again, the key is advanced communication. The sooner a conflict is brought to everyone's attention, the easier it usually is to find a positive solution. The BVW Administration, Coaches, and Sponsors are all committed to supporting student participation in a wide variety of activities and sports, and will assist in helping students navigate schedule conflicts.

## C. Outside of Class Rehearsals

To offer the range of musical opportunities and experiences our students and deserve and expect, some of our classes and extracurricular ensembles also have rehearsal expectations beyond the school day. A detailed schedule of rehearsals will always be available on the band calendar. These typically include:
$\delta \quad$ Red \& Silver Brigade Marching Band: During the marching band season (typically August through the end of October), Marching Band rehearses from 7:00 AM to the end of $1^{\text {st }}$ Block on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays (where there is no game / performance.) Marching Band also rehearses from 6:00-8:30 PM on Thursdays. Color Guard members have an additional rehearsal from 6:00-8:30 PM on Tuesdays throughout the marching season as well.
$\delta \quad$ Winter Guard: Typically rehearses Tuesday and Thursday evenings from November through early April.
$\delta \quad$ Rehearsals / Sectionals / Mini-Camps: Throughout the year additional chamber ensembles and / or sectionals may be scheduled before or after school. Additional rehearsals for marching, jazz, and / or concert bands may also be scheduled due to unique performance events.

## D. Summer Rehearsals and Camp

All members of the Blue Valley West Band Program are required to attend summer band camp held on the BV West Campus. Camp is usually held between the middle of July until the beginning of school. Dates and hours vary depending upon facility availability however the schedule is usually available by January each year. A significant amount of instruction occurs during these camps. Students who miss large portions of camp may be assigned an alternate performance spot for the competitive marching show.

## E. Schedules

The Blue Valley West Bands maintain a Google Calendar which is also synced into the Band App and the Band Website. Please refer to dates, times, and information about band performances and events on our Google Calendar. You can subscribe to the calendar so that it sends information directly to your phone, computer, or other mobile device. The calendar ID is bvwestbands@gmail.com.

## F. Eligibility

$\delta \quad$ KSHSAA Requirements: KSHSAA (Kansas State High School Activities Association) requires that band members pass 5 classes in the preceding semester to participate in music competitions and performances away from school. Students failing to meet semester eligibility may still perform in home concerts and athletic support performances.
$\delta \quad$ Grades: Students must be diligent in maintaining their grades in all courses. Students who have difficulty maintaining passing grades in other classes may be prohibited from participating in certain rehearsals, performances and / or special events until their grades improve.

## G. Make-up Work

Students may occasionally miss other classes for performances occur during the school day. Students are responsible for completing any coursework missed during that time.

## H. Instruments and Equipment

Students who primarily play flute, clarinet, alto sax, trumpet, or trombone must provide their own instrument. Percussionists must provide their own sticks, mallets, and stick bags. A full list of required percussion supplies will be provided by our percussion instructor. Students who play oboe, bassoon, tenor sax, baritone sax, horn, baritone / euphonium, or tuba may be issued a schoolowned instrument.

Students using a school-owned instrument will be responsible for regular maintenance of the instrument and charged for any damage or repairs beyond normal wear and tear.

Students are required to provide all sticks, mallets, valve oil, grease, reeds, and other essential supplies. These can be obtained through local music stores and / or via the internet. Students are strongly encouraged to provide their own mouthpieces throughout their band experience. Directors will gladly provide information and guidance as needed for students and parents to purchase supplies.

## I. Music

Students are responsible for the condition of any music and folders issued to them. Students will be required to pay for any missing or damaged music at the conclusion of the school year. Replacement costs vary and are depend on the item and cost from the manufacturer or publisher.

## J. Forms

Before participating in any band activities, there are several medical, transportation, and liability forms required by the Blue Valley West Athletics and Activities Departments. All forms are digital and available annually around the $1^{\text {st }}$ of June.

## K. Band Lockers and Cabinets

Lockers are used only for the storage of instruments and music during the school day. Lockers must be always kept clean and neat. Locks are to be locked at all times. Instruments must be stored in their case while in the locker. Students who fail to follow locker expectations may lose the privilege of using a locker.

## L. Food and Drink

Absolutely NO food, gum, candy, or drink (except water) is to be brought into the band room except for specially designated events.

## M. AST

Students may use AST to practice, work with a director, or hold student run sectionals. Students wishing to come to the band room for AST must obtain a written pass from a director the day they wish to come practice. Students are expected to be engaged in practice or working on academic assignments for the duration of AST.

## N. Transportation

Bus transportation is generally provided to all performances away from Blue Valley West. Students will have assigned buses for all trips. Students must use the transportation provided, unless prior permission has been given and the student's parents have signed the appropriate transportation release form. Parent chaperones will supervise each bus. Students should be dropped off before and picked-up after all events in a timely manner. Event schedules are always communicated via the Band App.

## O. Trips

On occasion ensembles from Blue Valley West are selected to perform at State, Regional, and / or National events. The costs to attend these events are generally shared between the school district and the band program and its students and families.

To participate in any trip performance, students must be in good standing with the school and district.

## P. Drug, Alcohol, and Conduct Policy

The teachers and administrators of Blue Valley West High School strive to maintain a safe and secure environment for all students. Therefore the use, possession, and distribution of drugs, alcohol, tobacco, vapes, E-Cigs, fireworks, and weapons by students is prohibited by both state law and school district policy. Students who bring or use such items to band rehearsals, performances, or other events will face the appropriate legal and school imposed consequences. Band students may face additional sanctions including possible suspension of performance privileges or expulsion from the band program.

Students involved in school athletics and academic activities also carry a responsibility to represent their school and community in a positive manner. Band students who engage in illicit activities or demonstrate conduct grossly inconsistent with the expectations and values of the band program may face consequences as outlined above regardless of whether the actions occurred at or outside of school. The safety and welfare of all band students, parent volunteers, teachers, and / or staff is always our primary concern.

## Section 5: Uniforms

Each band ensemble has a different set of uniform requirements. Some uniform parts are provided by the school and other parts by the student. It is each student's responsibility to ensure that the uniform is kept clean and worn properly.

Wearing a school uniform is both a privilege and responsibility. We will ALL be in uniform or out of uniform together. Do not remove, unbutton, or unzip any portion of your uniform while in public unless the whole band has permission to do so. When in uniform, you are to be careful with any food or drink you are allowed to have.

## Section 6: Fees / Fair Share / Fundraisers

There are certain costs associated with participating in and operating an active and successful high school band program. These may include uniform components, meals, transportation, lodging, entry fees, and supplemental instruction, and trips that students participate in during their time in the Blue Valley West Bands. Our Blue Valley West Band Boosters collect a Fair Share Payment from each band member to assist with the total costs of operating the Blue Valley West Band program. All band members also have several required uniform items to purchase or replace each year. The Fair Share may change from year to year and is set in the spring by the directors and Band Booster Executive Board. Families sign a financial contract with an attached payment plan for the Fair Share.

No student will be turned away from the band program for the inability to pay fees. Students with financial concerns are welcome to visit confidentially with a director at any time. The Band Boosters provide fundraisers year-round to help families offset the cost of their band fee. Many families utilize these, and some even pay their entire fee through various forms of fundraising. Information on fundraising activities and opportunities are provided by the Band Boosters. An important point to note is that per IRS regulations, fundraising earnings do remain with the Band Boosters. When a student graduates or exits the band program, any money earned through fundraisers will remain in the organization's general fund.

## Section 7: Performing Ensembles

Enrollment in the Blue Valley West Band Program is open to any student who successfully completes the previous year of band, or by permission of the directors. Students without prior band experience should visit with a member of our Performing Arts Faculty to review music course options if they would like to add music to their schedule. Following the conclusion of the marching band season, ALL current band students participate in a placement process that considers student effort; achievement of essential skills and concepts; and performance quality of selected musical etudes. The goal of this process is to place each student in the appropriate ensemble that provides them with an appropriate balance of musical challenge and enjoyment. Students with questions about their potential placement should visit with a director.

The Blue Valley West Band Program consists of several different co-curricular and extra-curricular ensembles:

## A. Concert Band

The Concert Band is a semester ensemble course open by placement audition to all woodwind, brass, and percussion students in grades 9-12. Students work on music fundamentals and expanding their musical knowledge and skill through performance of intermediate level literature. Concert Band students perform at 3-4 concerts and in an adjudicated music festival each year. Concert Band members are welcome to participate in all aspects of the band program.

## B. Symphonic Band

The Symphonic Band is a semester course open by placement audition to all woodwind, brass, and percussion students in grades 912. Symphonic band is the second level of band, and students will work on further development of their individual musical skills while rehearsing and performing advanced band literature. The band will perform at several concerts and at an adjudicated music festival each spring. Symphonic Band has also traveled to regional music festivals and performed by invitation at the Kansas Music Educators Association State In-Service Workshop.

## C. Wind Ensemble

Wind Ensemble is the most select band ensemble at Blue Valley West and consists of approximately 45 - 50 of the most advanced woodwind, brass and percussion students in grades 9-12. Placement is by audition and enrollment is for a semester. Wind Ensemble focuses on the performance of advanced and professional level band literature. The Wind Ensemble will perform at several concerts and at an adjudicated music festival each spring. The Wind Ensemble has performed at Carnegie Hall, the Kansas Music Educators Association State In-Service Workshop, and at the Music for All National Concert Festival.

## D. Jazz Ensembles

Students in the Blue Valley West Bands can participate in one of our Jazz Ensembles. Enrollment is open to students who are also enrolled in another band, choir, or orchestra course. Students focus on performing a range of traditional and contemporary jazz repertoire while developing a range of stylistic performance techniques and learning how to improvise.
§ Jazz Ensemble operates with a traditional big-band style instrumentation. Students perform at several concerts, community events, and in adjudicated festivals throughout the school year. Jazz Ensemble rehearses from 7:30 8:20 once or twice per week from November through late April and performs at 2-3 concerts and several festivals and community events throughout the spring semester. The BVW Jazz Ensemble has performed by invitation at the Kansas Music Educators Association State In-Service Workshop as well as other Regional and National events.
$\delta \quad$ Jazz Lab is a semester or year-long course open to any student interested in further developing their jazz techniques. Students focus on both individual practice and projects as well as combo and small ensemble rehearsals.

## E. "The Red \& Silver Brigade"

The Red and Silver Brigade is comprised of all band students in grades 9-12. Students rehearse music and learn choreography as part of their regular band class during the marching season (late August through the end of October.) Students perform in the stands and on the field at all Home Football Games and at several competitions around the midwest. The Red \& Silver Brigade has established itself as one of the premiere competitive high school marching bands in the Kansas City area, earning numerous accolades. These include being a 2-time Kansas Bandmasters Association State Champion and participation in Bands of America Regional and National Marching Competitions. The Red \& Silver Brigade has also represented Kansas at the New Year's Day Parade in London, England.

## F. Color Guard

The Color Guard is the visual component of the Red \& Silver Brigade marching band in the fall. Any student at Blue Valley West is welcome to participate - no prior experience is necessary. Students enroll in a Band Course in the fall to get Fine Arts course credit for their participation. Training sessions are held each spring.

## G. Winter Guard

Winter Guard is an extra-curricular extension of the Color Guard Experience. Students continue rehearsing throughout the Winter and Spring and prepare a unique show to participate in the Mid-Continent Color Guard Association competitive circuit where they have achieved considerable success.

## H. Basketball Pep Band

During basketball season students may participate in the pep band. The pep band performs for select home basketball games and post-season tournament games. Participation counts towards a varsity letter.

## I. Pit Orchestra

The Pit Orchestra provides the music for the annual school musical. Rehearsals are held after-school and on some evenings beginning about $1 \frac{1}{2}$ months prior to the musical and run through the final performance. Interested woodwind, brass, string, and percussion students should look for information in the fall.

## J. Chamber Ensembles

Each year woodwind, brass, and percussion students create different small ensembles and chamber groups for community performances and to participate in the KSHSAA Solo and Ensemble Festivals. Students should visit with their director in November to begin preparations for these events.

## K. Orchestra Winds

On occasion the band and orchestra programs will collaborate to offer a full orchestra experience. Rehearsal and performance schedules will vary depending upon the literature programmed and availability.

## L. Music Theory / Honors Music Theory

These courses are offered for students interested in expanding their understanding of music, and possibly considering studying music at the collegiate level. Enrollment is open to any Blue Valley West Student, although it is strongly recommended to take the class as a junior or senior. Students learn the building blocks of music and develop a deeper understanding of musical notation, melodic, and harmonic structures. Students who take the Honors Level analyze and compose music using common practice period techniques. Music Theory is a semester-long course, and Honors Music Theory is a year-long course.

## Section 8: Other Musical Opportunities

For students who wish to challenge themselves beyond their band class experience, a wealth of music experiences can be found both at school and beyond. Interested students should speak with their director about these opportunities.
$\delta \quad$ Private Lessons: All students can benefit greatly from specialized one on one instruction on their instrument. Blue Valley West maintains a list of area professionals who offer instruction on all wind and percussion instruments. The list is always available on via Canvas and in the Band App.
$\delta \quad$ KMEA All-District and All-State Bands: Each fall students in grades 9-12 can audition for the KMEA East Central All-District and KMEA All-State Bands. District auditions are held in November and the band performs in December. All-State Auditions are held in January and the All-State Ensembles perform in February in Wichita. ## A. Varsity Letters

Students who distinguish themselves through service, participation, and achievement above and beyond the curricular expectations of the band program may earn Varsity Letter.
$\delta \quad$ Eligibility Criteria: To be considered for a Varsity Letter, students must first meet the following eligibility conditions.

- Consistently meet and model program expectations.
- Earned an " A " in all band classes.
§ Supplemental Award Criteria: Students who meet the eligibility conditions must then also satisfy at least one additional supplemental award criteria to receive a Varsity Letter.
- Service: Serve on Leadership Team or complete 4 full years as a member of the BVW Band / Color Guard.
- Participation: Participate in an additional BVW Band Class or extra-curricular music ensemble. Examples: Concert Ensemble, Jazz Band, Winter Guard, Pit Orchestra, JPG Mentor, Chamber Ensemble, Pep Band (beyond required games,) Youth Symphony, All-Star Jazz Band, Church Orchestra, etc. Take lessons on your primary instrument outside of school for the full year.
- Achievement: Prepare and complete an audition for the KMEA / Sousa honor band OR perform a solo for a KSHSAA Solo Festival (in addition to any curricular honor band audition or solo performance requirements.) Earn a chair in the KMEA and / or Sousa Honor Band or qualify for the KSHSAA State Music Festival.


## B. Specialty Awards

At the end of the year students may receive additional recognition for special accomplishments or extraordinary service to the Band Program.
